





HOUSING



In our Crosswalk Youth Shelter, 16-year-old Ethan found himself tangled in a web of trouble. Despite the efforts of his probation officer, he resisted cooperation at every turn. With unwavering dedication, Crosswalk staff, walked alongside him in guidance and support. Despite the challenges they faced, they never lost sight of the possibility for a brighter future.

Over the span of six months, a remarkable transformation unfolded. With the Crosswalk team's diligent assistance, he found his way back to school and secured employment, laying the foundation for a stable future. No longer the defiant youth they struggled to reach, he took ownership of his actions and responsibilities. He was exactly where he needed to be, doing exactly what he needed to do.

Today, he has found not only stability but also a place to call home. Housed with his mother, he embodies the resilience and determination that defines the Crosswalk community.

HONOR



Emma, a female veteran, had once believed in the idea of a stable life with a loving partner. Little did she know that the person she trusted the most would lead her into a perilous situation. Living off the lease in an apartment, she faithfully made payments to her significant other, assuming that he was taking care of the rent. She was open with the landlord about the situation, assured that it was not a problem.

As the seasons changed, so did her life. The rent went unpaid, and the money meant for shelter found its way into other, less essential activities. The consequence: Emma found herself named in an eviction notice, her life unraveling in the biting cold of winter. With a 70lb German Shepherd as her only companion, she faced homelessness, crammed into her small sedan in parking lot.

Emma's story does not end there. Despite the eviction stain on her record, her credit in ruins, and a myriad of physical and mental health challenges, she was determined to rise. With a referral to VOA, Emma and her Shepherd were welcomed into our veterans' housing. She worked diligently with her case manager who found a ground floor unit in a quiet neighborhood with friendly neighbors, walkable to shopping, and surrounded by green spaces. It was a sanctuary for her and her loya companion.

The community in Cheney who offered her housing rallied around Emma, offering tenant incentives to help her start anew. From cable and internet hookups to a television, and even the relocation of her cherished family heirloom furniture from storage to her new apartment, the support was overwhelming.

As Emma settles into her new space, the scars of her past begin to fade. The warmth of a caring community has replaced the cold nights in her car. She's not just finding shelter; she's rebuilding her life.

HELP



Jessica was a software developer living in an upscale neighborhood of Spokane. Everything changed the day her boyfriend violently raped her and beat her until she had a traumatic brain injury. She was in and out of hospitals for the next two years for a brain injury and PTSD. During this time she couldn't work, lost her home, became addicted and needed treatment for her substance use. Jessica found Hope House Women's Shelter. She made the courageous decision to work through her trauma and achieve sobriety, has housing, and returns to Hope House every Wednesday, where she and her case manager co-chair Hope House's Narcotics Anonymous meeting.

Jessica, a year sober, has housing and returns with the support and guidance of her clinical behavioral health team and educated case managers, Jessica succeeded in obtaining her Section 8 housing voucher achieving stability and independence in the community.

HEALTH



In the face of a challenging divorce and looming eviction, Susan found solace and support at Hope House. Battling an \$11,000 landlord debt and grappling with frequent hospital visits, her life seemed to be in a downward spiral. Hope House, however, became the beacon of hope she desperately needed. With the guidance and assistance of the dedicated Respite case management team, a transformative journey began.

The first hurdle was securing stable housing, a critical step in rebuilding her life. Despite the daunting barriers, Susan, with the unwavering support of her case manager, successfully obtained a Housing Choice Voucher. Additionally, the case manager collaborated with a rental company to navigate the complexities and secure approval for an apartment, even in the face of formidable challenges.

One remarkable gesture stood out in this journey—when Providence required her back in the hospital, her case manager went above and beyond. Recognizing the urgency of the situation, the case manager visited her in the hospital to complete the necessary housing paperwork. This not only demonstrated a profound commitment to the individual's well-being but also expedited the housing process significantly.

Providence eventually discharged her into the care of Hope House Respite, a pivotal moment in this resilient individual's story. With determination and the invaluable assistance of Hope House, Susan stepped into a new chapter of her life just a few days later as she moved into her secured housing.


